My sisters and brothers in Christ,

As I am writing this I can look out the window and see the leaves on the trees beginning to turn. The calendar says that we are in the season of autumn, which has always been my favorite season. I can remember feeling excited, when I was a boy, at the changing colors of the trees, and the approaching opportunity to put on a flannel shirt, have acorn fights in the backyard with my friends and roll in the freshly raked leaf piles.

This is still my favorite season. I still enjoy the fresh, crisp chill of the air and the wonderfully colored trees that are filled with the beauty of God's creation. Autumn is also a sign of the approach of winter and although I still get a thrill at the first snow, I have to admit that I look forward to the approaching spring sooner than I used to.

These feelings and thoughts remind me of a wonderful passage from the scripture:

"For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven: a time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to pluck up what is planted...." [Eccles. 3:1-2]

I quote it today as a reminder of a profound truth that God's creation is <u>always</u> changing and being renewed. Change can be hard for us but we all need to be reminded of this truth. So if you are looking out the physical window of your home <u>or</u> the spiritual window of your life and you are seeing a season of change that you may not be looking forward to, remember that "For everything there is a season...." Remember too another passage from the scriptures which is written in Isaiah: "Forget the former things; do not dwell on the past. See, I am doing a new thing!" Whatever season we are in, God is there, let us rejoice and be glad in it!

Original, profound, *The Whole Town's Talking*, a novel in the tradition of Thornton Wilder's *Our Town* and Flagg's own *Can't Wait to Get to Heaven*, tells the story of Lordor Nordstrom, his Swedish mail-order bride, Katrina, and their neighbors and descendants as they live, love, die, and carry on in mysterious and surprising ways.

Lordor Nordstrom created, in his wisdom, not only a lively town and a prosperous legacy for himself but also a beautiful final resting place for his family, friends, and neighbors yet to come. "Resting place" turns out to be a bit of a misnomer, however. Odd things begin to happen, and it starts the whole town talking.
